

## What is HEERF?

Background

- Congress has authorized three rounds of federal relief funding in three phases of the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund, or "HEERF" program to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus ("COVID-19").
  - HEERF I: The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act) - March 27th, 2020
  - HEERF II: The Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSA Act) - January 14, 2021
  - HEERF III: The American Rescue Plan (ARP) March 11, 2021



## Differences between the spending plans:

For the purposes of this presentation, all funds will be referred to as HEERF I, II or III

HEERF I: The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act):

- Direct Support to Students- no less than 50 percent of the funds received under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students.
- Institutional Portion awards to cover any costs associated with significant changes to the delivery of instruction due to the coronavirus
- Additional emergency financial aid grants, subject to certain limitations.



## HEERF II: The Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSA Act):

On January 14, 2021, the U.S. Department of Education announced an additional \$22.7 billion available to higher education institutions to ensure learning continues for students during the COVID-19 pandemic under the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2021 (CRRSAA) as HEERF II.

Unlike HEERF I, HEERF II allowed additional expenditures including:

- Defraying expenses associated with coronavirus, including:
  - Lost revenue
  - Reimbursement for expense already incurred
  - Technology costs associated with a transition to distance education
  - Faculty and staff trainings
  - Payroll



## HEERF III: The American Rescue Plan (ARP):

The HEERF III appropriated approximately \$39.6 billion for the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF) and represents the third stream of funding appropriated for HEERF to prevent, prepare for, and respond to coronavirus. While HEERF III was structured like the HEERF II, there are certain important differences.

Broad areas of focus include:

➤Testing

➢Prevention

Reducing Barriers to Vaccination

Supporting Students

## HEERF III: The American Rescue Plan (ARP) Cont.:

HEERF III also outlined <u>Ineligible</u> Expenditures Including:

- Funding contractors for the provision of pre-enrollment recruitment activities;
- Marketing or recruitment;
- Endowments;
- Capital outlays associated with facilities related to athletics, sectarian instruction, or religious worship
- Senior administrator or executive salaries, benefits, bonuses, contracts, incentives; stock buybacks, shareholder dividends, capital distributions, and stock options; or any other cash or other benefit for a senior administrator or executive.;
- Religious worship, instruction or proselytization or equipment or supplies to be used for religious worship, instruction, or proselytization; or
- Construction or purchase of real property.



### Important updates:

As of the passing of the American Rescue Plan (ARP) on March 11, 2021, all remaining HEERF funds, <u>regardless of their distributing</u> programs, were compiled and should be awarded under HEERF III <u>rules</u>. In other words, if the District has not finished spending its HEERF I or HEERF II funds yet, those funds are now compiled under HEERF III rules.

HEERF deadlines have been extended to the end of FY 2022-23.





# What we have been able to do with the funding:

- Direct Student Aid- Emergency financial aid, reimbursements, cancellation of student debt, Bridge Grants and Completion Grants
- Personal Protective Equipment
- Stipends for class conversions
- Campus-wide cleaning
- Air systems and filters
- Student Support and supplies, software, hardware and hotspots
- COVID Testing
- COVID Screening
- COVID Vaccinations
- Increased safety and operations







On March 27th, 2020, the federal government passed the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES Act) which established the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF). HEERF is to assist enrolled students and higher education institutions during the unprecedented financial crisis caused by the coronavirus pandemic.

Each of the four Peralta Colleges received CARES/ HEERF Act Relief Funding. Each college submitted an Agreement and certification to the Department of Education with the assurance that the colleges intend to use no less than 50 percent of the funds received under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students.
