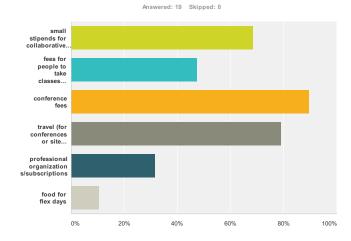
Q1 What activities do you think professional development money should be spent on? (check any # of responses)

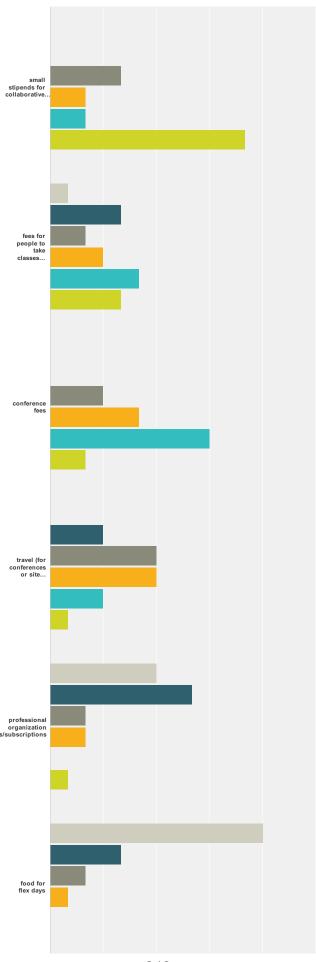

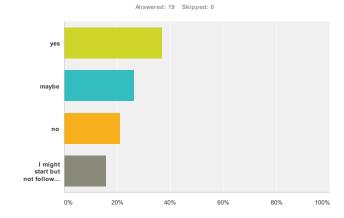
